MEDICATION AIDES

Public Acts 273 and 274 of 2023! HCAM completed a major initiative that will offer providers a muchneeded tool to attract and retain a strong caregiver staff.

Medication Aides are now permitted in nursing facilities!

OPPOSE AFC LICENSING CHANGES

House Bill 4841 would add unnecessary, burdensome staffing, training & reporting requirements to the Adult Foster Care Licensing Act. HCAM joined the bill sponsor's workgroup to help strengthen the rules without negatively impacting the sector.

OPPOSE FEDERAL STAFFING MANDATE

HCAM, working with the American Health Care Association, is actively advocating against staffing ratios, using member survey and other data to develop and share messaging state-wide and beyond.

ATTEND CONGRESSIONAL BRIEFING

Several staff and board members joined more than 500 industry colleagues in Washington, D.C. at the AHCA/NCAL Congressional Briefing. The group had productive meetings with legislators and staff, industry leaders and colleagues.



\$63.5 To providers from Medicaid MILLION Rate Increase

HCAM advocated for a Medicaid interim rate increase. Governor Whitmer signed an appropriations bill to

increase the interim rate by 2%,

from 2.5% to 4.5%, retroactively applied to January 1, 2023.

2023 FOCUS

To mitigate workforce and financial challenges, HCAM advocated for several forms of additional financial resources for providers

\$681 To staff from the Direct Care Worker wage MILLION increase since 2020

DCW Wage Increase & Expansion

On October 1, SNF direct care workers became eligible for an \$.85/hour increase up to \$3.20/hour

NEW! Certain non-clinical staff are newly eligible for an \$.85/hour increase.

The wage increase also applies to DCWs at licensed AFCs and HFAs that provide Medicaid-funded fee-for-service personal care services.

INITIAL SETTLEMENTS

In March, MDHHS agreed to an HCAM request to distribute initial settlements for providers' FY 2021 and 2022 cost reports, giving 80% of the cost settlements due.

In November, feedback about ongoing facility cash flow concerns prompted the department to amend the settlement policy to

allow providers to receive 100% of the initial settlement.



QAAP PAYMENT PLANS

HCAM asked MDHHS to allow more time for providers to make Quality Assurance Assessment Program (QAAP) payments. The department committed to working with providers on payment plans.

REIMBURSEMENT SYSTEM

HCAM is working with the state to create a new Medicaid reimbursement system to better support workforce stability plus provide adequate funding and predictability for providers.

HCAM continues to find ways to support membership with grant opportunities

Apprenticeship Training

The HCAM Department of Labor & Economic Opportunity Apprenticeship Grant supported more than 30 apprentices in receiving on-the-job training including nurse aide training, leading to additional skills, expertise and new roles. **HCAM increased the grant to \$3,000/applicant, upping the value for providers and employees in 2024.**

Dementia Training

HCAM is working with the Michigan Health Endowment Fund (MHEF) on grant opportunities focused on dementia training for assisted living providers.

Wound Care

Work is underway to resubmit an application for a Civil Monitory Penalty grant under the updated CMS criteria in 2024 that will bring expanded wound care training opportunities to members.
